

# Leaving Las Vegas Local 825 takes bold steps to protect members



A contingent of Local 825 and ELEC representatives returned from the Conexpo-Con/Agg trade show, which closed a day earlier than planned due to COVID-19 concerns and impending travel restrictions. President John Wood, joined by business agents, organizers and trainers, attended the expo. The largest heavy equipment showcase in North America, Conexpo is held only once every three years and attracted 130,000 visitors and 2,500 exhibitors. It features 2.67 million square feet of the latest equipment, products, services and technologies for the construction industry and offered educational workshops for construction industry professionals. After returning home Business Manager Greg Lalevee asked all who had attended to self-quarantine for 14 days to ensure against any exposure to the virus. # **COVID-19 Response Unit Established**

n early March, Business Manager Greg Lalevee established procedures to safeguard the health of members and administrative staff workers alike, allowing administrative work to continue. During the first week of April additional steps were announced to help members and signatory contractors grapple with information that changes rapidly.

Intended to eliminate misunderstandings and respond to questions, Greg and his leadership team established a COVID 19 Response Unit; a COVID-19 HOTLINE; and provided for ongoing Virtual Town Meetings.

The COVID-19 Response Unit's mission is to inform our members and signatory contractors of:

- workplace issues related to COVID-19;
- questions relating to the administration of our funds;
- concerns over how state (New Jersey and New York) and federal agencies are requiring employers and employees to conduct themselves;
- and to provide general up-to-date information on the virus as it relates to our industry.

The COVID-19 Response Unit consists of three teams charged with receiving questions via the hotline, routing them to the appropriate authority and responding in the virtual town meetings, as well as through our ongoing communications via emails and social media. **TEAM 1** focuses on information and is headed by William Vaccaro and Victor Grigoriew. They will conduct ongoing virtual town hall meetings to provide the most up-to-date information that and responses to questions received through the hotline.

**TEAM 2** focuses on administration and is headed by Kevin Young and Drew DiPalma. Team 2 staffs the hotline, logs calls and routes them to appropriate sources for responses. The most Frequently Asked Questions will be communicated in the town meetings, the IUOE825.ORG website, the 825 App and social media outlets (Facebook and Instagram).

Team 2 also coordinate with New Jersey and New York Departments of Labor and with Federal agencies for information on unemployment and other important information. In addition, they identify signatory contractors who specialize in workplace decontamination and disinfection and provide these resources to signatory contractors.

**TEAM 3** focuses on Job Assistance. Team Members, Outside Construction: Tim Muller, Chris Lalevee and Joe Grace.Inside shops: Alex Kolbasowski, Evan Daniels and Pat Hjelm.

Team 3 determines answers to hotline questions and responds. Issues include job

site etiquette and navigating problems related to COVID-19. Responses are shared for use in town hall meetings and communications platforms.

## Virtual town meeting requirements

Virtual town meetings will likely be held using the GOTOMEETING.COM web platform. To participate, one must download the GO-TOMEETING app to his or her phone or computer in advance. Callers who request to participate will be emailed a link in advance of the meeting with information as to the time of the meeting.

## **Covid-19 hotline**

The Local 825 COVID-19 HOTLINE is (973) 671-6991. Callers should leave their name, telephone number and a brief reason for their call. All calls will be documented and then directed to the appropriate team for response. Every effort will be made to provide responses within a reasonable time frame.

## **Training Center updates**

Apprentice classes in March and April were postponed until further notice. May and June classes are on hold at present. Information on classes will be made available once the information is certain.

# Five-generation Shinn family spans Local 825 history



The history of Local 825 spans a hundred years of events and times that define the history of America and the Labor Movement that helped build it. The history of Local 825 is also the story of union families. These family names include the Shinns, Reardons, Webers, Campbells, Cremones, Lalevees, Vaccaros and many more.

One of these families extends five generations and covers the entire life of Local 825, beginning with its first president.

#### **The Shinn Family**

(Provided by Timmy Shinn, great-grandson of Local 825's first president.)

In 1917, **Edward T. Shinn** ran steam-driven crane equipment for Linde-Griffith, a pile-driv-



ing contractor based in Newark. Around 1917 or 1918, the steam shovel local in which he was a member merged with IUOE Local 106 of Albany and this combined group applied for a charter to form what is now Local 825.

(As an aside, this merger introduced **Joseph** 

**S. Fay** to Local 825 history. Joe Fay joined the Steam shovel and Dredgemen's International Union of the American Federation of Labor in 1909 at the approximate age of 17. This local became IUOE Local 106 of Albany in 1915, which later merged with Edward Shinn's steam shovel local.)

The IUOE granted Local 825's charter in 1920. Joe Fay became its first business man-

ager and Edward Shinn its first president. Edward Shinn served as president through 1952, when he died on the eve of the IUOE national convention in Chicago.

Edward's wife **Josephine Shinn** was very involved in union activities at the 4 Fleming Avenue hall in Newark. She helped with union activities and ran some of the food drives and soup kitchens for out-of-work members during the Great Depression.

Joe Fay played an integral role during the Local's peak organizing years from the 1920s through the 1950s. He was involved in labor confrontations during the 1920s and 1930s, a period he later said required standing up

to "union busters." He retired to Avon and lived to 80 years of age and died on Aug. 9, 1972.

**Edward H. Shinn:** Known as Edward Shinn Jr., he learned the family trade early and became a crane operator at age 16.

At 16 he owned and rented a pair of pneumatic dump trucks in Jersey City. Not long after, he started a ready-mix concrete business in Newark, Shinn and Walker. He invented a truck-mounted hoist, which worked as an outside elevator. It was used to raise equipment and materials at building sites. Edward filed for a patent on his invention but the advent of the hydraulic forklift made the truck-mounted hoists obsolete.



He founded United Crane and Shovel Service Company Inc. in 1937. His brother (Tim's uncle) was J. Raymond Shinn, who served as a Local 825 Business Agent Ray retired in 1977 at the age of 56. He passed away in Melbourne, Fla., in 1994.

Kenneth J. Shinn, (Tim's father), worked as a crane operator for the family's United Crane along with his brother Edward Shinn III. Kenneth came into Local 825 in 1949

great-grandson of founder Edward T. Shinn, Timmy started working in the shop at age 14 during summers as a mechanic's helper. He went to work full time at 17, got his book at 18 and was running long-boom conventional crane equipment by the age of 20.

Over the years, he worked at United Crane and also worked exclusively out of the hiring hall for nine years, working directly for many contractors throughout the state. In addition to crane operation, Timmy ran various types

of earth-moving equipment, including crawler-mounted backhoes, loaders, dozers, etc.

After his grandfather's death in 1987 Tim managed United Crane for eight years before purchasing it from the remainder of his family in 1995. The business continued for 20 years before closing in 2015 after 78 years.

Tim's brother, Kenneth Shinn Jr., and cousins Ed Shinn IV, Glenn and Dean Magnusson were all Local 825 members. Cousin Stephen Shinn operates Shinn Brothers Cranes.



Anthony Shinn. Timmy's son, is a fifth-generation member of Local 825. He currently is employed by Bay Crane Service in Hillside, NJ. Three cousins also represent the fifth generation of Shinn family membership. They

are: Edward Shinn V, Kevin Shinn and Devin Magnusson.

# Covid-19 rains on St. Patrick's Day parade

The oldest and largest St. Patrick's Day Parade in the world fell victim of the Covid-19 virus, breaking a record stretching back to 1762, eighteen years before the Declaration of Independence.

The "St. Paddy's Day Parade" grew into one of New York City's greatest traditions with the steady flow of Irish immigrants into the United States that continually increased into the Nineteenth and Twentieth centuries.

IUOE General President Jim Callahan had been selected to lead this year's parade as Grand Marshal. An estimated 150,000 spectators had been expected to cheer the hundreds of groups and marchers that come from miles around, joined by an even greater number who watch on TV.
