Local 825 leadership and members rallied in support of Phil Murphy, the Democrat candidate to replace Chris Christie in the fall election. Murphy is the current frontrunner against several other Democrat candidates in the June 6 primary. He has supported issues important to organized

labor and has won wide support from labor groups. If he becomes the Democrat candidate in the primary, he will campaign for governor against the Republican candidate. The fall election on Nov. 7 will put all seats in the Senate and Assembly up for grabs.

Spring brings new work and fresh challenges

Although we're used to braving winter's elements, we appreciate when spring brings nicer weather and additional work.

After last year's shut down of TTF-related projects, we look forward to a busy, uninterrupted summer season. NJDOT, Turnpike and Parkway projects will keep us busy, along with work that continues on the Hudson River and other bridges, like the Bayonne Bridge, WittPenn, Pulaski Skyway and Manahawkin Bay.

This year, we look forward to new projects. Construction is expected to begin on a \$49.9 million project to replace two Holland Tunnel Piers, 9 and 204.

Army Corps beach restoration projects are approved for:

- Construction and beachfill from the Manasquan Inlet to the Barnegat Inlet, an approximate \$129 million project;
- Great Lakes beach nourishment, from Cape May Inlet to Lower Township, worth nearly \$15.5 million; and
- Great Lakes nourishment, from Townsends Inlet to Cape May Inlet for approximately \$15.8 million.

Water Infrastructure

We have begun to train our focus on water infrastructure advocacy. Our latest Local 825 ad is headlined, "We Save Water." It promotes our interest in conservation and discusses the need to replace aged, inadequate infrastructure.

ELEC also has been instrumental in advancing a Water Accountability Act in both the Assembly and Senate. We are monitor-

ing this development, with the hope that a bill can be sent to Gov. Christie to act on before he leaves office.

New TC set to open

After a few years of planning, municipal approvals, design work and construction, our new training facility in Wawayanda is set to open. The facility is truly state of the art and will provide greater access to members who live within its 100-mile radius.

A grand opening will be scheduled for this spring and we expect to begin offering classes as early as this summer.

Local 825 to host IU0E

We have offered our New Jersey training center to host this year's IUOE Training Conference, which will be open to training staff from all IUOE locals in the east. The two-day conference is a great forum for locals to consult on common issues and learn from each other by sharing "best practices.

The training center and staff have been doing great work, as witnessed by the photos you will see in the following pages.

Looking ahead

We have two important dates coming up: both benefitting our scholarship fund. Our fifth annual golf outing will take place on May 13; and the second annual clay shoot will be held on June 25. We hope as many of you as possible will plan to join us.

Murphy's stand on labor issues wins members support

ocal 825 Operating Engineers were on hand to welcome gubernatorial candidate Phil Murphy to the Dayton Training Center in February.

In addition to more than 250 members, Business Manager Greg Lalevee, President John Wood and members of the Executive Board made the Democrat candidate to succeed Gov. Chris Christie feel right at home.

"Phil Murphy is the type of leader who understands the issues facing New Jersey workers and we know he'll always have our backs," Greg said, as he introduced the candidate.

Murphy won loud applause when he promised to create jobs and "Keep 'right-to-work' legislation out of our state!"

He affirmed his commitment to working families and investing in the state's energy, water and transportation infrastructure.

"He has the right experience to create jobs and make investments that will deliver economic growth for many years to come," Greg said. "We're confident he will make the infrastructure systems we rely on for everything from safe drinking water to getting to school and work a higher priority once again."

Following the rally, Murphy met individually with members and took a tour of the training center.

Murphy, the former U.S. ambassador to Germany, must first win the Democratic Party nomination over a slate other Dem opponents. He has secured endorsements from all of New Jersey's 21 counties and will appear on the county line, a major advantage over his opponents.

On the Republican side is Lt. Gov. Kim

Guadagno, who is facing off against four opponents in the primary. Guadagno is currently seen as the Republican front-runner.

The New Jersey Primary election is on June 6. The winners will campaign against each other until the general election determines who the next governor will be on Nov. 7.

All legislative seats are up for grabs

In addition to a new governor, this year's election will determine the makeup of all 120 legislative seats in the NJ Legislature.

We will play an active role in this election and will be asking for members support. Our PAC will continue to host our annual reception for candidates and we will endorse the candidates who we believe will best represent our interests.

The need for blood is constant and critical. Every 2.5 seconds, someone needs blood. Although 80 percent of the population will need blood at some point, less than five percent of the population donates it. It is estimated that nearly four million Americans would die each year without life-saving blood transfusions.

That's why we salute the 39 members, some of them shown in these photos, who took the time to donate blood at the Spring-field headquarters in late February, the first blood drive of the year.

A second (and final) blood drive will take place between 1:30 p.m. and 7:30 p.m. at the Holiday Inn, 68 Crystal Run Road, Middletown, NY, just prior to the District 4 meeting. This drive was rescheduled from March 15 when it was postponed due to the snowstorm.

We have all come to expect that if our loved ones or we need blood in an emergency, it will be available. But our aging population continues to need more transfusions and new advances in medicine and an increase in the number of people diagnosed with cancer have increased the need for blood, forcing New Jersey and New York State to import thousands of units of blood from other parts of the country.

If you're in the Middletown area on May 10, make a commitment to visit the drive and give the gift of life.

ELEC Plays Role in Helping Trenton Tackle Water Quality

over the past two months ELEC has played a major role in lobbying for passage of the Water Quality Accountability Act (A4569), a bill to enhance the reliability and safety of New Jersey's drinking water and significantly boost water infrastructure investment.

On February 13th, the Water Quality Accountability Act was introduced in the Assembly, unanimously approved by the Environment and Solid Waste Committee, and sent with amendments to the Assembly Appropriations Committee. The bill was sponsored by Assembly representatives Tim

Eustace (District 38); Robert Karabinchak (18); John McKeon (27); Valerie Vainieri Huttle (37); Daniel Benson (14); and was cosponsored by Jamel Holley (20).

On March 27th, Senate President Sweeney introduced a Senate version of the Act, which was sponsored by Linda Greenstein (District 14) and Christopher Bateman (District 16).

ELEC has been working tirelessly to help pass this legislation, participating in committee hearings and lobbying our representatives for their support. As always, our key focus is expanding job opportunities for our members, and this bill would do just that by encouraging investments in water infrastructure.

The key requirements of the bill include field testing of valves and hydrants, a notice of violation action plan for public water systems, managing water main renewals under a 150-year replacement plan, and the implementation of a cyber-security program. The bill also includes yearly written confirmations from public water system officials saying these requirements are met.

We will continue to monitor this legislation closely and provide updates on its progress.
