Our union is secure and so is our future

After two years of canceled meetings and Zoom calls, it was a pleasure greeting our members in person and shaking hands face-to-face at the semiannual meeting (page 3).

It was an even greater pleasure to be able to report on our present conditions: strong funds; full employment; expanding membership and market share; our first Earn and Learn program is in full swing as we pursue the goal of becoming an accredited technical college; and the long list of infrastructure jobs that once we only dreamt about is now becoming reality.

Meanwhile, the Labor-Management Fund (ELEC) is now 10 years old. We established it in 2012 to help create job openings and increase Local 825's market share. By every measure, it has more than fulfilled our expectations. It has reimbursed members for \$1.286 million in credential expenses since the program's inception; its Market Recovery Program has generated more than \$65 million in wages and benefits at a cost to us of \$22.5 million – a payout of three to one. In the last 12 months it has delivered 918 jobs from non-union competition. And it has allowed us to grow in markets and projects that we once believed we could not win.

The Safe Crane initiative conceived in 2016 consists of a model ordinance for towns and

cities to ensure that cranes have licensed operators and appropriate insurance. It has gained wide acceptance and been adopted by several cities and towns to date, most recently Bayonne and Jersey City.

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State of the Union: strong and growing stronger

Semiannual meeting returns to pre-covid attendance

usiness Manager Greg Lalevee and the Local 825 United Slate of candidates won unanimous reelection to their posts for another three-year term, bringing approximately 400 members to their feet in applause at the June semiannual meeting.

Business Manager Greg Lalevee thanked the members for their confidence and pledged to continue working on their behalf, day in and day out.

Attendance at the meeting in the East Brunswick Hilton was back to pre-covid levels and enthusiasm was high.

Greg's report covered the strong condition of the funds, the high level of employment and the ever-increasing market share that shows that the demand for Local 825 Operating Engineers continues to grow.

"We have simple goals," Greg said. "To be the sole source of skilled labor in our area; to sign more contractors that perform our work; and to increase the work opportunities for our union's members.

"Since January, the organizers signed elev-

en new contractors and organized 47 new members."

The level of work coming in is unprecedented, boding well for a continued, strong future.

Greg told members to remember three key takeaways from the meeting:

 The funds are strong and in great financial condition; And

- 3. "If our states capitalize on the opportunities afforded by the passage of infrastructure bill, we have a once in a lifetime chance to chart this organization's future beyond our wildest expectations."


Market Recovery and Credential Reimbursement Program Updates

ELEC marks tenth anniversary with achievements

ELEC825's Market Recovery Program continues to help signatory contractors win work in markets that they usually don't win in, leading to more work for union members. This includes both large and small projects in the private sector. The Market Recovery Program makes signatory contractors competitive and our members busy.

ELEC825's Credential Reimbursement Program continues to make sure that members are "Ready on Day 1" with reimbursements of credentials necessary to work on many projects. Make sure that you're ready on Day 1 too.

Here's how our programs have delivered for members since their inception.



New officer to guide transition to technical college

ocal 825 has hired Jennifer Thomann as Chief Academic Officer to help guide the training center into a combined apprenticeship program and degree-granting technical college.

"In concert with the 'Earn and Learn' hybrid education program we have introduced with Hudson County Community College, Jenn will develop our own curriculum to help build our program and complete our transition," said Business Manager Greg Lalevee.

The Local 825 Training Center is currently accredited through the Council for Occupational Education (COE) but not yet a degree program.

"In addition to developing curricula and educational programs, Jenn will work to expand the Training Center's partnerships with

community colleges throughout New Jersey," said Greg.

"By broadening our network with other community colleges, we make it easier for students to take classes close to home. When they're ready, they can transfer their credits back to us as they work toward their apprenticeships," Jenn explained. Full apprenticeship remains a four-year program and the classroom training portion can be integrated into it.

The first Earn and Learn students completed their semester at Hudson Community College (HCCC) and arrived at the Dayton Training Center in May. They are continuing classroom training combined with training on heavy equipment.

Jenn comes to Local 825 from the Aubrey Group, where she worked as Director of Project Management. With several years of grant writing experience, she successfully spearheaded Local 825's application to win the Department of Labor's New Jersey Place 2.0 grant, which now funds the program.

The daughter and granddaughter of tradesmen, Jenn grew up with a strong appreciation for the building trades. She is a graduate of Bryn Mawr College of Philadelphia and earned a Master of Arts degree in Educational Theory and Policy from Pennsylvania State University.
