Phil Murphy, NJ Transit CEO Kevin Corbett, Amtrak Chairman Anthony Coscia, NJ Senators Menendez and Booker and NJ DOT Chairman Dianne Gutierrez-Scacetti.

Representing labor, Greg related how profound the ripple effect of this project will be on New Jersey workers. Even before construction begins, stone and sand must be quarried to make cement, which must be transported. All of these workers are feeding families, paying mortages, sending kids to school ... to grab their share of the American Dream. Greg thanked the officials for their roles in helping to pass the Infrastructure Investment and Jobs Act and helping to make projects like this one possible.

Years of advocacy for Hoboken project pays off

t took 15 years but Hoboken finally approved Hoboken Connect, a multi-phase redevelopment project in and around the Hoboken Rail Station.

"This has been a major area of interest for us for several years now," said Business Manager Greg Lalevee. "We're pleased to see it finally approved, now we want to make sure our members get their share of the work."

The project will consist of public and private projects. They will include a new bus terminal, rehabilitation of the Ferry Terminal, redevelopment of Warrington Plaza and bicycle and pedestrian improvements to Hudson Place. The private component will include a mixeduse residential building, a 20-story Class A office building with a rooftop terrace, 5,000 square feet of retail space and related public open space investments.

It is estimated that approximately 9,800 construction jobs will be created. On completion, the project will directly and indirectly support 15,290 permanent jobs. In addition to jobs, the City of Hoboken will see millions of dollars generated in annual retail spending and revenue, while NJ TRANSIT will benefit from ground lease



payments and increased ridership.

Hoboken **Council President Michael Russo** said "The redevelopment of the transit hub is a big win for the residents of Hoboken and a big win for the residents of New Jer-

sey." Russo thanked the Operating Engineers for their help advocating for project approval over several years. "I am proud that they stood with us and I am proud to stand with them," he said.

Security concerns & World Cup bid doom old grandstand

The Meadowlands Race Track grandstand, which opened in the Bicentennial year 1976 and hosted 25,000 patrons every Saturday night throughout its glory days, is being dismantled piece by piece.

Shuttered since 2013, it was replaced by a new \$100 million grandstand on the site of the former backstretch. The old building, which hosted the 1994 World Cup, is a sad reminder how times change.

Now, in an effort to once again host the World Cup soccer matches in 2026, the NJ Sports & Exposition Authority (NJSEA) approved a \$33 million plan to dismantle the

grandstand over a period of months.

"Work is going on inside as we speak," said Rich Decker a Local 825 member and Lead Engineer for the NJSEA. "The building itself is scheduled to come down later this year."

The NJSEA noted "security concerns" posed by the proximity of the old grandstand to the adjacent MetLife stadium. Along with the demolition will come roadway realignments and other site enhancements intended to improve the site and its chances to win the World Cup.

Decisions on host sites are expected to be announced as early as next spring.

embers of American Legion Post 532 raised more than two thousand dollars for Veteran Haven North in Glen Gardener and Veterans South in Winslow, NJ. The facilities house and care for otherwise homeless veterans. Although the facilities are run by the state, they still accept contributions.

Post 532 is made up of Local 825 military veterans and is sponsored by Local 825. It has grown to 26 members since it was established in 2018, with six new members coming in as part of the current apprentice program.

"So we are brothers twice," said Joey Bove, Service Officer for the Post 532. "Veterans and union brothers."

Post 532 holds a monthly meeting. For members who find it too far to get to, it is also available via Zoom. Any military veteran is encouraged to join. "The more members we have, the more outreach we can offer and the more we can give back to the veteran community," Bove said.
