














11TH Golf outing tees off under blue skies

22 apprentices first to earn associates degrees

Graduation is the culmination of an idea, the fulfillment of a dream

An idea announced by Business Manager Greg Lalevee at the 2017 semiannual meeting came to fruition nearly eight years later as 22 Local 825 apprentices became the first apprentice group to earn their Associates degrees from Hudson County Community College.

"We congratulate these first Local 825 graduates," said Greg. "Their dedication and persistence – pursuing academic study simultaneously with working as apprentices – provides inspiration to those who will come after them."

The grads still have two years left of their apprenticeship but they now have an Associate's degree as well.

On hand to congratulate the graduates at Red Bull Arena in Harrison, in addition to Greg, were Training Director Willie Vaccaro, Shana Grace, Chris Szpila and Jenn Thomann.

Greg's 2017 announcement of his plan to convert the Training Center into a technical college was the easy part. A lengthy application process followed. Along with the development of a curriculum and the a novel Earn and Learn program with Hudson County Community College, the program took months and years before the first classes began.

Evolving technology changes in the industry were the driving force behind the move. Greg compared these changes to watershed moments in the past, such as when steam engines were replaced by hydraulics and many other changes that have taken place through the years.

"We survived as a union because our predecessors had foresight and adapted to changing circumstances," he said. "We owe it to the next generation to do the same for them. Advance thinking and preparation will position Local 825 to remain strong for years to come."



embers embraced the return of the Health Fair in May at the union hall in Springfield. Popular in the past, the health fairs were a casualty of the covid-19 pandemic. Bringing them back was a priority.

The new-and-improved health fairs were appreciated by the members who lined up early to enter. They especially appreciated the new features, such as: blood pressure screenings, biometrics and lab services that included a CBC (complete blood count); a CMP (to check the body's fluid balance; cholesterol levels; PSA tests for men; and a Hemoglobin A1C test to measure average blood sugar levels.
